Walking tour of Cardiff's civic centre and beyond

Led by Margaret Butler MBE, this two hour walking tour begins at the National Museum, within Cardiff's impressive civic centre, at 2.15pm. The tour includes visits to the City Hall, Alexandra Garden, the 12th century St John's Church and some of Cardiff's unique Victorian and Edwardian shopping arcades.

Millennium Stadium

We are privileged to be joined by David Hines, Senior Architect at Populous (formerly HOK), the stadium architects, for this behind the scenes experience at the home of Welsh rugby. See the changing rooms, walk down the players' tunnel, but don't touch the hallowed turf! This tour begins at the Stadium at 2.30pm and lasts one hour.

Llandaff Cathedral

Cardiff's mainly Gothic cathedral at Llandaff is built on one of the oldest Christian sites in Britain. It has a history of disrepair and restoration since the 12th century, including damage during a WWII air raid. The restoration that followed included a new chapel and a modern reinforced concrete arch surmounted by Epstein's Christ in Majesty. You will travel three miles outside the city centre to start your one hour tour at 2.30pm in Llandaff.

Cardiff Central Public Library

We are privileged to be joined by Anthony Walsh, associate at Stride Treglown Davies, to visit Cardiff's new public library. Opened in March 2009, the library is an impressive six storey, 55,000 square feet building boasting the latest characteristics in environmental architecture. It includes a green roof for rainwater retention, heat gain and thermal insulation. Our visit begins at 2.15pm in the company of Rob Boddy, the Library Manager.
