The practicalities of providing a placement

Take a look at this quick reference guide to find out what's involved when you host a student on placement.

Purpose

Psychology placements provide a vital opportunity for students to experience working in a role that would be suitable for them once they graduate. It gives them the chance to put their theoretical knowledge to the test in a real-world setting and this can be of huge benefit to organisations, like yours.

Role

During their placement, students engage in various stimulating activities that are useful to the organisation that's hosting them. These activities should stretch our students and provide valuable learning experiences.

While some tasks may be routine administrative duties that a regular employee might carry out, they shouldn't dominate the student's time, and will ideally be limited to no more than one day per week.

Students often shadow professionals within your organisation to learn job-related skills. As they gain confidence, they gradually take on more responsibilities unaided, sometimes participating in long-term projects from start to finish. Being given the opportunity to reflect or analyse the outcomes of their work is valuable too. We really encourage this kind of hands-on involvement as it's highly rewarding for our students and can yield very useful results for you too.

Location

Some students like to stay close to home, others are keen to explore the world so placements can take place anywhere in the UK or abroad.



I completed my placement at The Caswell Clinic which is a Medium Secure Unit in Bridgend.

I supported my supervising Clinical Psychologist with patient assessments, psychological formulations, administering and scoring psychometric tests, audit projects, and group work. I had the opportunity to shadow other members of the multidisciplinary team and gained invaluable insight into the role of a Clinical Psychologist in the NHS.

I also gained knowledge, confidence, awareness of the profession, and lasting relationships – in fact, the same supervisor has continued to be a mentor to me for over 10 years! The placement confirmed my decision to pursue a career in Clinical Psychology.

Duration and hours

For our third year BSc students, placements must last for at least 30 weeks starting around late September (usually they last 36 weeks to include a break over the Christmas and Easter period).

MSc placements run for 12 weeks between May and September. If your organisation is very quiet during August, you can offer a placement from May to July and all MSc students must complete their placement by early September.

Generally, students will expect to work Monday to Friday, 9 am to 5 pm, but there's room for flexibility.

It's also possible that some students will have specific circumstances that they'd like you to consider, for example they may have caretaking responsibilities. It's best to discuss their requirements before their placement is finalised.

If you have a particular period of time when you'd like to host a student, or specific hours you'd like them to work, you can state this in your placement ad or in your invitation letter.

Supervision

Normally, students are supervised by professional psychologists who are chartered with the British Psychological Society. However, we understand placements happen in diverse settings, so any appropriately qualified senior person can serve as a supervisor.

Regular check-ins are essential and students must be able to access their supervisor if they need to. Some students work with their supervisor on a daily basis, others less frequently, but they should always have at least half an hour together every week.

Our university supervisors will also engage with you and our students early on to ensure a smooth experience for everyone. These meetings can be in-person or online, depending on everyone's availability, preferences and logistics.

Training

If you can offer any training to a student while you host them, this can be very beneficial, but it isn't mandatory.

Reporting

As a placement provider, you won't be required to submit reports but we'll ask you to participate in surveys. Your periodic meetings with our university supervisors will also give you an opportunity to verbally report on the placement.

Our students are expected to write a reflective report at the end of their placement, which will contribute to their degree assessment. Additionally, BSc students may deliver oral presentations, providing insights for future students and academic staff.

Holidays and sickness

For BSc placements, the 30-week period doesn't include holidays or prolonged sickness. To align with university term dates, the placement should last for 36 weeks, allowing students to take breaks during Christmas and Easter. But students aren't required to follow university holidays, and you can ask students to follow your organisation's annual leave entitlement policy.

MSc placements involve 30 hours per week, with 7.5 hours dedicated to independent study. Annual leave isn't typically taken during MSc placements, but arrangements can be made between you and the student you host.

For illness or injury during a placement, you just need to follow your standard procedures and notify us if there's a prolonged student absence.

Health and Safety Guidelines

To ensure the safety of all students on placement, we have standard health and safety requirements so, before a student begins their placement, we'll ask you to complete a health and safety checklist. If you have any questions about these requirements, please contact psych-placement@cardiff.ac.uk

Insurance

We strongly advise that all placements offer honorary contracts to students. This ensures that they're covered by your liability insurance. Additionally, students involved in assessments or working with clients should be covered by indemnity insurance from the British Psychological Society.

For students working with children, vulnerable adults, or clients who pose a risk to themselves or others, we have specific safety guidelines which we can provide.

Payment

Our students don't receive additional funding during their placement so we hope that you'll provide some level of financial support. That might include travel expenses, a contribution towards food and drink, a clothing allowance or a relocation reimbursement.

Some placement providers choose to pay our students for the skills, talent and creativity they bring to their organisation and this is very much appreciated by the students they host.

Providing financial recognition can really go a long way to attract students and boost their self-worth whilst they positively contribute to your team.



I worked as an Independent Domestic Violence Advocate at Cardiff Women's Aid where

I provided one to one emotional and practical support for survivors of

domestic abuse. I had a case load of up to ten clients and I was on duty one day a week to deal with advice, professional calls and women dropping in whilst experiencing a crisis. I particularly enjoyed witnessing how cognitive behavioural therapy helped clients to progress over a twelve week programme. Through my placement, I learnt how to work under extreme pressure and, although it was extremely challenging at times, it was also very rewarding. I enjoyed making a difference and my placement will definitely help me in my future career.

The application and selection process

We want it to be as easy as possible for you to arrange hosting a student on placement. Here's how it works.

How students apply for your placement

If you've received this document from a student you'd like to host on placement, feel free to skip this part. But if you'd like to invite students to apply to do a placement with you, here's how it works:

You'll provide an advert to let our students know that you're looking to host a placement. Don't worry, we can provide guidance or help to create this with you.

For BSc Students: There are typically two or three application rounds when students apply for a placement. The first application round is in December and the second is in February and all placements start in September.

At each round, we'll send you a batch of student applications which will contain a cover Letter and CV for each applicant. If you prefer students to fill out a specific form, just share it with us, or provide a link to your online form with your placement advertisement. Of course, if you have your own recruitment process, students can apply directly to you instead.

For MSc Students: The first round of applications is in December, followed by a second round in February, for a summer start. The process is the same as for BSc students, making it easy for you to host both BSc and MSc students in the same year.

How you'll select your students

As mentioned above, we'll send you a batch of student applications for you to consider after each application round.

It's important to note that when we send these to you, we're not making recommendations or endorsing their suitability for your placement. You're far better placed to determine if they're the right fit for you.

As part of your assessment, you should conduct appropriate checks for anyone working at your institution, such as criminal records and any appropriate physical and mental health checks. This is especially crucial for placements involving psychologically demanding tasks or work with vulnerable people. We trust your professional judgment, supplemented by your standard screening measures, to assess the suitability of applicants for such roles.

Once you have selected your student, you will send them an invitation letter or email outlining the terms of the placement you'd like to provide.



Selecting the right applicant is an important part of the placement process so please complete any necessary checks or screenings before accepting a student for placement. This will ensure you find a compatible student for your organisation.

We're here to make the process as straightforward as possible so feel free to get in touch at any time.
